# Service of Worship

Fifth Sunday After Pentecost

July 9, 2006

Eleven o'clock in the Morning

The lectionary passages this morning emphasize the nature of God's authority and power in distinction from the world's notion of power. In 2 Samuel, we learn that although David was called to lead at a young age, he flourished because God was with him. The Mark passage reveals people doubting Jesus' authority because he was the son of a carpenter. And in 2 Corinthians, Paul boasts in his weakness because it is through our weakness that Christ's power is displayed.
