

Today is the first Sunday after the start of classes. The lectionary passages for today are fitting for this Opening Sunday of the academic year. The beginning of the new year is a time ripe for both reflection and anticipation, and the Old Testament passage comes from the Song of Solomon, and speaks to the joy and hope of a new season—a time when flowers appear on the earth, and the time of singing has come. The scripture lessons from James and Mark focus on the importance of authentic faith, and prod their readers to consider what it would mean to open their lives in radical ways to the transformative power of Christ.


