Today we celebrate the second Sunday in Advent. The scripture passages this morning from Malachi and Luke both have an emphasis on repentance. In Malachi, the Lord is likened to a refiner's fire, purifying and transforming the people of Israel to ready them to encounter God. Luke's gospel tells of John the Baptist preaching repentance in the wilderness and calling people to "prepare the way of the Lord!" The liturgical color of Advent is purple, which denotes penitence, a suitable mode for preparation to meet God.

NOBEL PEACE PRIZE

At the same time as we worship this morning in Duke Chapel, in Oslo, Norway. Bangladeshi economist Muhammad Yunus and the Grameen Bank he created is being awarded the Nobel Peace Prize for leveraging small loans into major social change for impoverished families with loans as low as \$9, helping beggars start small businesses and poor women buy cellular phones and basket-weaving materials. His economic vision for India has been replicated successfully to help impoverished communities worldwide.

Microcredit has become a significant aspect of Duke Chapel's own social vision. Too often we use "black box" investing strategies, where we invest in large funds and have no idea what the money is being used to support. As long as the returns come out the other end, we are pleased. Socially responsible investing allows us to look into the box and to use our capital, while still enjoying financial returns, in ways that build the kingdom of God. This Sunday representatives from the Durham-based Latino Credit Union and Self-Help Credit Union are processing with our offering. Both of these organizations are among the finest in the nation at facilitating community investing that lifts up those on the margins of our society. In the summer of 2004, they performed John Rutter's *Mass of the Children*, which was conducted by the composer.
