

This morning's scripture readings draw a connection between the miracle of the manna for the Israelites in the wilderness, and the life and person of Jesus. The bread from heaven in Exodus represents God's power, provision, and care for the Israelites. Yet the miracle of the bread from heaven is not limited to the manna in the wilderness, but finds fruition in the radical in-breaking of Jesus—the bread of life—whose nourishment satisfies all who seek him. In his letter to the Ephesians, Paul encourages the church at Ephesus to build up the body of Christ. In the same way that bread satisfies the physical body, Christ strengthens the church community, the body of Christ on earth, in unity, hope and love.

About Today's Guest Preacher

Today we welcome The Reverend Dr. Richard B. Hays, the George Washington Ivey Professor of New Testament at Duke Divinity School. He is a leader in the field of New Testament studies, internationally recognized for his work on the letters of Paul and on New Testament ethics. He is the author of many books, including *The Moral Vision of* the New Testament: Community, Cross, New Creation, which was selected by Christianity Today as one of the 100 most important religious books of the twentieth century. Dr. Hays' most recent book is The Conversion of the Imagination: Paul as Interpreter of Israel's Scripture. He has published numerous influential articles and reviews in scholarly journals. An ordained United Methodist minister, he has preached in settings ranging from rural Oklahoma churches to London's Westminster Abbey. His academic honors have included the John Wesley Fellowship, the Pew Evangelical Scholars Program grant, and the Henry Luce III Fellowship in Theology. His wife Judy is Associate Professor of Nursing and the Chair of the Accelerated BSN Program at the Duke University School of Nursing. She is a past President of the Congregation at Duke Chapel. Their son Chris is a doctoral student in Old Testament at Emory University, and their daughter Sarah is a personal trainer who also leads a folk-blues band in Los Angeles.


