The gospel lesson for this week expands on last Sunday's theme of Jesus as the bread of life. We feed on this bread in the sacrament of Holy Communion, which we celebrate this morning. There is a fourfold pattern in the communion liturgy, reflecting the four actions of Jesus at the Last Supper. Jesus *takes* the bread, *blesses* it, *breaks* it, and then *gives* the bread and wine to his disciples as his own body and blood. When we eat the bread of life, we become the body of Christ for the world, and we participate in the work of God's kingdom on earth.


