The scripture lessons today emphasize the nature of God's kingdom in contrast to human notions of privilege and authority. In Proverbs 31, a woman is revered for her gifts of faith, compassion and tremendous hospitality. In the gospel of Mark, Jesus' disciples bicker about "who is the greatest," and Jesus responds by reorienting them to the vision of the kingdom. Jesus challenges the disciples, and all people, to reflect the radical hospitality, care, and provision that is personified by the capable wife in Proverbs.

FLOWERS—Today's flowers are given for the glory of God in loving memory of Doris Altmeyer.


