## SERVICE OF HOLY COMMUNION

Pentecost  
June 4, 2006  
Eleven o'clock in the Morning

This Youth Sunday service marks the day of Pentecost, found in today's reading from Acts, when Jesus' promise was fulfilled that the Holy Spirit would come upon the disciples, filling them with the power of God's presence and giving life to his people. The Old Testament lesson from Ezekiel bears witness to God's breathing life into the "dead" Israelite nation, which had been conquered, exiled, and left without hope. In the gospel of John, Jesus explains to his disciples that he must go away, but that "the Advocate" will come testifying on behalf of Jesus and guiding the disciples in all manner of truth and righteousness.

### **DIRECTOR OF UNIVERSITY AND COMMUNITY RELATIONS**

Duke Chapel has announced the appointment of the Revd Gaston Warner as the Director of University and Community Relations, a position created to build and strengthen connections between the Chapel and the University, Durham, and larger audiences at home and abroad. Warner will begin work in July. He will be the key interface between Duke Chapel and those who take daily responsibility for Durham's future, including the city authorities, major non-profits such as Self-Help Credit Union, and local pastors and churches led by Durham Congregations in Action. The Revd Warner brings to the post a remarkable range of suitable experience, from pastoring an inner-city church to establishing a non-profit finance initiative of his own. Most recently he has been working in development at Duke Divinity School. The Revd Warner's role as University and Community Relations Director will also stretch beyond Durham, as he will be looking for opportunities to make connections and join forces with those seeking to combine faithfulness with social transformation regionally and nationally. The Chapel hopes to play a leading role in a conference planned for October designed to help churches explore transferring their endowments from the stock market to community development finance initiatives such as Self-Help. At Duke, the Revd Warner will be assisting the Dean of the Chapel in his work of presenting intellectual engagement of Christianity with the university.
