



The Faith & Money Conference will explore investment strategies that mean not having to choose between helping those in need and getting a healthy financial return. Ched Myers, theologian, scholar and founder of Bartimaeus Cooperative Ministries in Oak View, California, will be the featured speaker.

The day is not just for those who have their own investments but for anyone who has an interest or say in the investments of for-profit or non-profit organizations. In addition to discussing such investments as mutual funds, 401 (k) plans and IRAs, the conference will look at Community Development Finance Initiatives (CDFIs), which are aimed at helping those in poverty find a way out.

“It's not a straight choice between giving all your money away to charity or creaming off a little of the interest you earn on your investments,” says the Rev. Dr Samuel Wells, Dean of Duke Chapel. “The secret is putting the capital to use for social good without necessarily giving it away. We'd like people and organizations to consider investing at least some of their capital in a CDFI.”

In addition to Duke Chapel and Immaculate Conception, event co-sponsors are Good Work, Sabbath Economics Collaborative, Self-Help Credit Union and the North Carolina Council of Churches. This is the first of a series of such gatherings Duke Chapel is hoping to organize in cooperation with local churches and non-profits.
