Christ the King Sunday is the last Sunday of “ordinary time,” which draws the church year to a close. This day completes the Christian journey through the life of Jesus Christ on earth and in heaven, which began with the preparation for the birth of Jesus in Advent. Christ’s kingdom was not one of military might or oppression, but a kingship redefined by sacrificial love and servanthood. On this day we celebrate Christ’s kingship over all creation and are reminded that as Christians our loyalty lies with the kingship of Christ before worldly powers.
